

"Look at me now, I am the happiest woman in the world! I walk around with confidence and dignity. Now I can work and change my life." - Mulu

Obstetric fistula stole Mulu's joy, confidence and relationships for 17 years.

Today, because of you, Mulu is regaining her health, happiness and sense of self, after receiving surgery at Hamlin's Addis Ababa Fistula Hospital.

Mulu was born and raised in Benishangul-Gumuz, a north-western region of Ethiopia. She grew up in a small village and, after discovering she was pregnant, was looking forward to welcoming her newborn baby.

But after two agonising days of obstructed labour, Mulu was taken to the nearest hospital for emergency care. Her beautiful baby was stillborn, and she was left incontinent.

Due to the complexity of her injuries, Mulu underwent multiple surgeries over the years.

Finally, in March last year, Mulu returned to Hamlin's Addis Ababa Fistula Hospital to receive a specialist diversion surgery and her injuries were healed.

Christchurch Physiotherapist Mentors Hamlin Team

Her suitcase crammed with donated training shoes (very helpful for women who have developed a footdrop), underwear (to help hold incontinence pads in place when exercising in the gym) and socks for the cold nights, Christchurch's Ann Johnson recently visited Hamlin Fistula Hospital in Addis Ababa.

Ann is an experienced Women's Health Physiotherapist who voluntarily took on the role of physiotherapy mentor for Hamlin Fistula Ethiopia in 2019. She was visiting the UK, ready with a suitcase full of donations for the hospital in March 2020, when the COVID pandemic hit. Unfortunately, Ann had to rush home to New Zealand before lockdown started.

While keeping in contact through Zoom sessions, it has been a long wait to resume visiting. Finally, in February 2023, Ann was able to visit again.

Staff asked Ann's help writing postnatal guidelines for the hospital. Taking World Health Organisation and international guidelines, Ann and Selam, the Lead Physiotherapist, worked to tailor the guidelines to Ethiopia's local context.

Ann also taught the physiotherapy staff about how to assess women for Pelvic Organ Prolapse caused by childbirth - an issue increasingly presenting in women coming to the hospital.



Here in New Zealand many women are initially treated with physiotherapy, a vaginal pessary (a medical device to hold the prolapse in a good position), and surgery if needed. With samples of pessaries donated by Christchurch Women's Hospital, the physiotherapists were able to experience how flexible the pessaries are and discuss the pros and cons of different types.

A hidden epidemic of Pelvic Organ Prolapse in Ethiopia occurs because half of Ethiopian women don't have access to midwifery care in childbirth. Compounded by teenage pregnancy, childhood malnutrition, and carrying heavy loads, prolapse is often left untreated for many years. This painful condition becomes so severe, that for half of these women their uterus hangs into their vagina or outside their bodies.

Like fistula patients, this is traumatic to their physical, mental, social and sexual well-being. Many women are divorced because of their condition - some becoming Nuns.

One 78-year-old Nun, recently treated and cured at Hamlin Fistula, had Pelvic Organ Prolapse for 40 years. Grateful and happy for her healing, she remarked, "If I had this chance 40 years ago, I wouldn't have divorced my beloved husband."

Thanks to volunteers like Ann and our supporters, women with childbirth injuries receive life-changing treatment from Hamlin's expert medical team.





Providing Safe Childbirth for Every Woman

For many years, when Drs Reg and Catherine Hamlin sent young women home healed from the Fistula Hospital in Addis, wearing a new dress, the most important instruction the women were given was, "When you get pregnant again, before the birth, start walking to the nearest hospital." The Hamlins' long-term dream was for midwifery training and midwifery centres in remote rural areas. Many of these centres have now been established.

Ethiopia's climate, geography and regional security can be challenging and dangerous at times. Many women in remote villages must navigate mountainous, difficult terrain to reach maternity care.

Every rural Hamlin Midwifery Centre serves a catchment of about 50,000 people in surrounding villages. But some of the villages can be 40-60 km away over rutted dirt roads, often

inaccessible by bus, or even fourwheel drive or motorbike in rainy season.

For women living in poverty in far-lying villages, transportation to a Hamlin Midwifery Centre during labour can be impossible. They have no choice but to give birth at home without medical care, facing childbirth injuries like obstetric fistula, or stillbirth and even maternal death.

Over 10,000 Ethiopian women still die every year of maternal causes.

In Hamlin Midwifery Centres in Gorche and Teticha, only a few of

the hundreds of pregnant women from distant villages make it to birth safely with a Hamlin Midwife.

We can solve this by building maternity waiting rooms. By building rooms where women can come to stay in the weeks before their baby is due, pregnant mothers can access the life-saving care of the Hamlin Midwives.

We can provide a fistula-free and safe childbirth for every woman.

We need to raise \$45,000 to build two waiting rooms. One generous couple have already donated \$20,000.

We still need \$25,000. You can impact the life of a mother and her entire family by donating today.
